Careers at Compass

Despite the social-distancing restrictions in place due to Covid-19, it has been an excellent term for careers activities at Compass School.

Year 11 are well under-way in the process of making their post-16 applications for next year. During October 2020, every pupil in Year 11 received a virtual one-to-one careers interview with a qualified careers advisor; this provided them with a wealth of personalised information about courses, colleges and apprenticeship programmes. A select group of year 11 pupils participated in a virtual assembly led by Dr Noel-Ann Bradshaw, the Head of Computing and Digital Media at London Metropolitan University. In this assembly, pupils learnt about the wide range of benefits to studying Mathematics at A' level, or even at degree level.

Year 7 students had a virtual assembly to learn more about the huge variety of jobs available in construction and they will be receiving more assemblies about different jobs and industries in 2021.






Community Matters

Very present always in my mind for our students are; wellbeing, inclusion and aspiration and of course the importance of reading to access these for all; this was underlined during the time spent apart. This way to communicate with others has been highlighted never more so than now, when so much exploring and staying connected happens through reading and writing. Reading should: support, entertain, educate, amuse, inform and transport the students of Compass.

“Young adult child's literacy development is dependent on this **interconnection** between **reading and writing**.

Therefore **reading plays a major role in writing**.

At the same time, practice in writing helps children build their **reading skills**.”

Engagement with the world and their own thoughts, feelings, dreams and future careers can be organised, shared and elevated by exploration in reading, noting down and sharing their findings with writing. Please encourage your child/ren to participate in all that the library can offer - in school or virtually.

At Compass we have always celebrated black history all year round. In and from the library, students can always find a broad variety of books and projects with which to engage in broadening their knowledge. That being said, to find U.K. published books that are representative of all the cultures living here, is not easy. We are very fortunate to have Mr Huntley as our Principal for many reasons, this term we were able to benefit from his family's connection to publishing. I was delighted to receive a donation from Mr Huntley of 'hard to find' books which include facts from black history, very sadly unknown to most. To engage students, I shared findings from one of these, in slides and organised an online workshop for groups of students with publisher and activist, Eric Huntley.

Facts we should all know.

The real McCoy means quality!

Where did the phrase, 'the real McCoy' come from? What does it mean?

Elijah McCoy (1843-1929) was born in Canada where his parents went to escape slavery. As a young man he was interested in machines and tools. His family returned to the USA after the Civil War, when slavery was done away with. He got himself a job working with machinery and quickly realised he needed to solve the problem of how to oil machines whilst they were moving.

In 1872 he invented and patented 'The Drip Cup' and 23 new oil lubricants; his fame quickly spread all over the world! People began to ask, "Is this the real McCoy?" as his inventions were so good and copies of his work would fail to function in the same brilliant and reliable way!

He also went on to invent an ironing board and a lawn-sprinkler as well as new brands of oil and had his own company in Michigan to make and sell his inventions!

It was a great term for learning, especially considering the year we had so far. I was delighted to see how well students from all year groups engaged with opportunities and I'm very much looking forward to more exploration from our young people! Whoever said curiosity killed the cat, was surely mistaken, the key to fulfilment, is to be a life-long learner!

La Sección Femenina fue constituida en Madrid en 1934. Desde su nacimiento hasta su liquidación, en 1977, estuvo dirigida por Pilar Primo de Rivera, hermana del fundador de la Falange, José Antonio Primo de Rivera. Durante la Segunda República, las militantes de la Sección Femenina realizaron tareas de apoyo a la militancia masculina del partido, especialmente visitas a los presos del partido y a sus familias, así como tareas de enlace entre los presos y la calle. Mientras duró la Guerra Civil, pasó a prestar apoyo a las familias.

El ministerio va a estudiar una modificación de la Seguridad Social, a efectos de la pensión y propuesta por el Defensor del Pueblo, para equiparar tanto el Servicio Militar como el Servicio Social de la Sección Femenina de la Falange Española, el cual era un deber nacional que Franco impuso a las mujeres de entre 17 y 35 años y que equivalía al servicio de las armas de los hombres.





Black History Month



Facts we should all know.

Dr Charles Drew (1904 - 1950) otherwise known as "The father of the blood-bank" is certainly one person to thank! The work he pioneered on enhanced storage methods and higher quality blood transfusions saved many lives during the London Blitz in World War Two and in all the years since. Dr Drew did extensive original research in blood chemistry, fluid replacement, and the variables affecting blood preservation culminating in a trail blood-bank that was a great success! He actually became a doctor because his sister tragically died of tuberculosis; he also campaigned for increased opportunities for people of colour to study medicine.

"When a body loses a significant volume of blood, specific fluids other than blood can be given intravenously to keep the heart pumping and prevent hypovolemic shock from happening."

"Hypovolemic shock is a life-threatening condition that results when a person loses more than 20 percent (one-fifth) of their body's blood or fluid supply. This severe fluid loss makes it impossible for the heart to pump a sufficient amount of blood to your body."

We owe a huge debt of gratitude to Dr. Charles Drew. We are all connected in ways we don't always realise, this amazing man lived a short but valuable life, let's always remember him.







On behalf of the students and the PE team I thank the governors for their continuing investment in our school's sports programme of activities, not least in giving students access to outside expert professionals such as Ballers, Greenhouse and Kylie Bond, but also, in investment in extra equipment such as the new basketball hoops for use at lunchtime and break time. We are very hopeful of a further 5 outdoor table tennis tables to be distributed around the school for use at lunch and break. It's great to see this commitment to our students' well-being and we encourage them to embrace the opportunities this support brings!

Maths Marvels!






Jenga in Social Times club!




Art at Compass





Samples from year 9 Urban project
