

The Importance of Reading



Accelerated Reader and Bedrock Vocabulary

Star Testing is scheduled to take place during the week beginning July 4th, and we want as many pupils as possible to come out of the test with a reading age that is in-line with, or exceeding, their chronological age.

In September, we launched **Accelerated Reader** and **Bedrock Vocabulary** with pupils in order to support their reading and academic vocabulary. The results that we are seeing are really promising and show just how much progress our pupils are capable of when they are working hard.

As we approach the end of year exams, we are also approaching our final Star Reading test of the year. This test, which measures pupils' reading ages, is the way that we are measuring progress in reading across the year. Your child will know their reading age and it will be shared with you on their school report.

Attainment: average percentage increase of by year group

Year Group	Average Growth %
Year 7	21%
Year 8	17%

Our data is showing the incredible progress that our pupils are making!

Support your child's reading

There are a number of ways that you can support their progress:

- Make sure that your child is completing their Bedrock homework. The minimum requirement is 20 points per week but they can (and often do) exceed this!
- Make reading a priority. Encourage your child to read for 15 minutes every evening.
- Use subtitles on the television!
- Ask your child to read to younger siblings.
- Speak to your child about the book that they are currently reading: what it's about and who the characters are.
- Encourage your child to take an Accelerated Reader quiz as soon as they have finished their book at home. They have a better chance of passing the quiz and reaping the rewards!

Striving for Success



Exam grades do not define us, but they do give an account of what we have learned at different stages of education and what we can accomplish. End of year exams take place for all pupils in June, and the results will be issued in each pupil's report. These also help your pupils and their teachers understand their strengths and areas they need to focus on in the year ahead.

We have already begun gearing up for these in school, counting down the weeks and subjects providing pupils with revision resources. It is important that pupils are preparing for these exams at home as well, making use of their knowledge organisers and the online resources available to them.

We want all pupils to leave for their summer break with a sense of achievement and accomplishment, knowing that their academic year has been a successful stepping stone to the next part of their journey towards that destination to which they aspire.

Whether pupils are sitting their GCSEs, their end of year exams or their Star Reading Test, we want to make sure that they are striving to make gains every single day.

Prize-giving 2022

Our annual Prize-giving Ceremony is scheduled to take place on July 14th. This year, we are very happy that we are going to be able to hold the ceremony in St James' Church, the first time we have been able to hold a physical ceremony in two years! We are looking forward to rewarding our pupils for all of their hard work in lessons, enrichments, their Accelerated Reader and Bedrock usage and for showing our core values consistently. 
