

Humanities Hone Their Skills

As the academic year closes, students across Year 7, 8 and 9 have continued to explore and thrive in humanities. The completion of summer assessments in History, Geography and Citizenship was an apt display of how hard many students have worked this year, giving them an opportunity to exhibit both their knowledge and skills.

Year 10 followed suit by completing their summer mocks, showing real determination to revise through their work experience and into exams week.

With exams over, Year 9 turned their focus to the local environment. Looking into the history of Bermondsey's very own Ada Salter, they conducted a field study and walking tour of the many contributions she made to the community. They were able to appreciate and articulate how Ada really did 'beautify' Bermondsey, and some even managed to grab a picture with the leading lady herself!



Likewise, geographers were given the opportunity to explore how far the Borough of Southwark can be deemed a 'honey pot' for tourism. They analysed a number of factors along Tower Bridge that explain why Southwark attracts so many visitors each year, and the impact this has on the local area.

Year 10 Geographers broadened their local study to the wider radius of London, with an investigation of the impact that the 2012 Olympic Games had on three different sites within Stratford. Students looked at the social, economic and environmental impact of the games to see if the area was successfully regenerated. This will form part of their Paper 3 Geography GCSE.

This term was encompassed by application. Students applied this year's learning to a culminative assessment, showcasing their ability to retain and recall a range of key knowledge. They then applied this to different physical environments, to really understand how learning inside the classroom allows them to interpret the world around them.



Maths News

It has been a busy term for our students. We kicked off with our second GCSE Revision Residential of the academic year to PGL Marchant's Hill in Surrey where our Year 11 students participated in intensive revision sessions over three days in preparation for their final exams. It has been amazing this year to be able to offer all Year 11 students this opportunity in preparation for their exams.

Maths Week

In June we celebrated both Pride month and Maths Week London. It's great fun combining these two important events and our Year 7 students gallantly took on our code-cracking challenge as part of LGBTQ+ history month celebrations. During the World War II, code breakers played a crucial role in breaking Nazi Enigma codes that were believed to be indecipherable and students had the opportunity to learn about one such cryptographer, Alan Turing whose work we celebrate and recognise at Compass. Turing was not only an extraordinary mathematician but also a war hero, saving countless lives through his work. Students worked fantastically to decrypt this challenging cypher; developing resilience and their problem-solving along the way.



Inspirational Learning

Year 8 and 9 students attended interactive lectures on Mathematics from the amazing Rob Eastway, founder of Maths Inspiration and local Southwark resident. Rob has written a number of books including 'Maths for Mum and Dads' and 'Maths on the back of an envelope - Clever ways to (roughly) calculate anything' and set up a national programme of interactive lecture shows that aim to inspire teenagers to pursue mathematical subjects to a higher level. Year 8 took part in the fun and interactive Curious Maths Quiz where the answers are full of mathematical surprises and without even realising it. The audience are introduced to important ideas in algebra, trigonometry, fractal geometry and more. Year 9 instead delved into the science of games. If you think games are just for fun, then think again! They contain some of the most important maths you'll ever need in daily life, from managing money to out-thinking competitors.



Fascinating Fractals

The whole school also set to work on constructing a pride themed 3D Sierpinski Tetrahedron whilst learning about amazing geometric shapes called Fractals. Many famous fractals are self-similar, which means that they consist of smaller copies of themselves. All our students have been brilliant working together as a team but a shout out has to go to Miss Clapham's Year 9 class who excelled themselves working together to create a super-efficient production line.



In Year 10 Sarah Salim was the first, of hopefully many students, to attend the 'Girls like Maths (and Physics!)' programme at King's Maths School. It is an outstanding school where 95% of results are above an A! Over the four days they explored new ideas, listened to female speakers in the field and practised their problem solving!

Careers at Compass

A group of year 10 students have participated in the Future Frontiers mentoring program, in which they have visited Funding Circle, a leading platform for supporting small businesses with loans. The students have made their way into Funding Circle's central London office on four different occasions, and every time have been treated with a delicious lunch!

Each student was given a professional mentor, and through weekly conversations with them, was able to discuss and explore their personal skills, qualities and interests. All the students who have taken part in the mentoring program have come away with stronger ideas about their future career aspirations and feel more confident in making their post-16 choices next year.

It has been wonderful to see all the students thrive in a professional working environment, and form such positive relationships with their mentors in only a short space of time. On Monday, the students arrived at school in professional working clothes for the annual 'Dress to Impress' day. In order to prepare for their week of work experience, students spent some time planning their routes on public transport, and were not discouraged by the planned tube and train strikes that week!

Students also spent some time creating a first draft CV using the online careers platform, Unifrog. It was fantastic to see the students taking the time to reflect on all the important employability skills they have developed by taking part in extra-curricular activities such as sports clubs, music lessons, theatre productions, Duke of Edinburgh, baby-sitting and enrichment slots. The students then put these skills into good practice during their week of work experience. Students attended a wide range of placements, such as working in local primary schools, nurseries, architecture firms, cafes, dentist surgeries, sports centres, youth clubs, and even in the Yamaha music shop on Tottenham Court Road!

It was fantastic to hear all the positive feedback from employers about how Compass year 10 students behaved with real maturity, integrity and dedication throughout the week. Student Leadership


